OA is a place where compulsive eaters of any stripe can find health and happiness.

What has changed most in OA for me over the past twenty-plus years is me! It's not that I let go of 50 pounds (23 kg) and have worn the same size since. It's not that I developed amazing friendships with

OA's help or got a program for living that helps me respond to my daily hassles and major losses with sustained abstinence. It's my relationship with a Higher Power who has given me sanity and a modicum of maturity. I learned about that Higher Power because my fellow OA members treated me with unconditional love. That love and respect still exists in every meeting. I hope they and Overeaters Anonymous continue for fifty more years. To make that happen, I must do my part to spread the word.


A Call To Service
